

GETTING A COURT ORDER FOR NAME CHANGE CARROLL COUNTY

What to File:

- You will need:
- 1) Completed Application for Change of Name
(Adults: Forms 21.0, 21.1, 21.5, and supplemental affidavit)
(Minors: Forms 21.2, 21.3, 21.4, 21.5 (get official packet from the court);
 - 2) Any kind of copy of birth certificate; and
 - 3) \$71.00 filing fee.

Note: An applicant for change of name must have lived in Carroll County for at least a year at the time of the application. The applicant need not present proof of residency. However, the applicant must sign the Application for Change of Name, which includes a statement that the applicant has lived in the county for at least one year immediately prior to filing the application.

Note: The Carroll County Probate Court does not grant fee waivers for name changes. Equitas Health and TransOhio are currently working to secure financial assistance for those who need help with fees.

Where to File:

You must file in person at the Carroll County Probate Court, located at 119 South Lisbon St., Suite 202, Carrollton, OH 44615, (330) 627-2323.

Fees:

\$71.00 filing fee, payable by cash, check, or money order made payable to Carroll County Probate Court.

Tips for Filing:

- Use your full middle name instead of your middle initial.
- You may either type your application or write using ink. If you are writing, make sure it is legible.

Publication:

Notice of your name change application must be published one time **at least 30 days before** your hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in Carroll County. The court will send the required documents over to the paper on your behalf. Once publication is complete, you will receive a bill for the newspaper publication ranging from \$50-\$70.
